## Hit and Run

HIT AND RUN EARLY AND STEAL LATE. H\&R with:

- BATTERS: Bonifacio, Butler, Cespedes, DeJesus, Forsythe, Seager, and N.Walker.
- BASERUNNERS: Bay, Bonifacio, Cespedes, DeJesus, Encarnacion, Forsythe, Holliday, Seager, Stubbs, and N.Walker.
Board Game: With runners at 1 B and $3 \mathrm{~B}, \mathrm{H} \& \mathrm{R}$ only with 0 or 2 out.
Computer Game: Never H\&R with 2 outs. Check for SB instead.


## Pinch-Running

See the usage chart. In the $7^{\text {th }}$ or later, PR with a SB threat if we're tied or down 1-2 runs. Stubbs is the main guy; also Bay, Bonifacio, and
Forsythe. Note that Marquis and E.Rogers have 15 speed, Buchholz has 12 speed, and Batista has 11 speed, for runners in scoring position.

## Stealing

- In the $4^{\text {th }}$ or later, $0-1$ out, score $+/-2$ runs: Bonifacio, Cespedes, and Stubbs have the green light to steal 2B with 27+ chances.
- In the 7th or later, score $+/-1$ run, add Avila, Bay, Butler, Encarnacion, Forsythe, and Seager. Steal 2B with 27+ chances.
- LIMIT all but Bonifacio and Stubbs to 1 straight steal attempt per series (but continue to $\mathrm{H} \& \mathrm{R}$ whenever the instructions allow).


## Pinch-Hitting

See the usage chart. Bonifacio and Forsythe are often your best bets; DeJesus and Stubbs next. Do not use anyone marked "DO NOT USE."

## Sacrifice

NEVER. Barry does not believe in it.

## Runner Advancement

Use the Adams Tables. Computer Game: Play like it's your own team.

## Outfield Throws

Always throw for the tying/go-ahead run in the 7th or later. Otherwise, throw unless chances are $33+$. Computer Game: Follow this principle.

## Hold Runner on First

Always hold if the score is within $+/-4$ runs, UNLESS the runner is absolutely no threat to steal. EXCEPTION: Do not hold vs. a PR hitter.

## Play Infield In

PLAY IN in the 7th or later, 0-1 out, tying/go-ahead run on 3B.

## Intentional Walk

Barry's seen it work. Use it sparingly, but do it if it makes sense to you.

## Pitch From the Stretch

In the 7 th or later, score tied or we're up 1 , with a threat on $3 B$.

## PITCHING STRATEGY

## Managing the Starters

If our offense is clicking, we have a chance. Have confidence in our starters - let them fatigue - and then bring in the relievers in waves.
We have three rules this year:

1. EVERY STARTER (except Batista and Marquis) PITCHES UNTIL FATIGUED OR REDUCED.
2. DO NOT REMOVE A STARTER THROWING A SHUTOUT.
3. NO STARTER SHOULD EXCEED 11.7 INNINGS IN ANY GAME.

Rookies M.Rogers (8) and Smyly (6) have double-digit grades, but short fatigue ratings. If the game's within 2 runs when they fatigue, go to the bullpen. Otherwise, let them stay in until they fatigue again.
Buchholz (2), Eovaldi (3), Hanson (1), Pomeranz (4), and Rosenberg (9) have only one positive peripheral among them, but we need innings. If we lead, it's tied, or we're down by 3 or less when they fatigue, go to the pen. Otherwise, they stay in until it's JOBA TIME or until we close the gap.
Marquis (5) gets to make all of his starts, but he has a helpmate. As soon as he gives up 4 runs or a $5^{\text {th }}$ inning baserunner, put in E.Rogers, who can go longer than 2.7 innings, as needed. In later innings, if the game is close, go to the better grades; otherwise, it's JOBA TIME: all beer is half price!
Batista (7) is our weight to bear. We had no idea he would be so valuable to us when we selected him in the $8^{\text {th }}$ round of the draft, but he gives us 10 innocuous starts AND 30-plus relief innings in one roster spot. He must go at least 5 innings, but we're hoping for 6 . Make him work. Hard.

# 2013 Grand Cayman Havens Emergency Instructions 

## Using the Bullpen

We have more non-innocuous relief innings than last year; however, this is still not a deep bullpen. We have $\mathbf{4 3 1 . 3}$ total relief innings (or about 2.7 innings per game) and $\mathbf{3 7 1 . 0}$ NON-INNOCUOUS innings (almost 2.3 per game). Unfortunately, these innings are scattered in 10 relievers. Review these notes and the chart below for usage guidelines. Good luck.
W.Lopez (A), RHP: He's our closer. With $\mathbf{6 6 . 3}$ innings, he can come in if we're tied or up $1-3$ runs to stop a rally in the $8^{\text {th }}, 9$ th , or later for the save or win. If he coughs up a lead, yank him. Limit: 1.7 innings per game.
L.Perez (B), LHP: With only 42.0 innings for the whole year, he comes in ONLY if it's tied or we lead and ONLY for short bursts in the $7-8^{\text {th }}$ innings. Pretend he has an $f 3^{*}$ fatigue. Limit: 0.7 inning per game.
M.Lowe and Pryor (B), RHPs: These two setup guys have $\mathbf{6 2 . 3}$ innings combined. THINK OF THEM AS ONE RELIEVER with enough innings to set up, which is their role despite all the negative peripherals. Only one of them will be active at a time. Their job is to hold the lead when we're ahead in the $7-8^{\text {th }}$ innings only. Limit: 1.7 innings per game.

Batista, Carpenter, and Rosenberg (C), RHPs: These three middle relievers have $\mathbf{9 2 . 3}$ wild innings between the them to keep the game close if we trail by a few runs, mostly in the $5-7$ th innings. Two will be active most months. God help us. Limit: 1.3 innings per game.
T.Robertson (C), LHP: This middle reliever has only $\mathbf{2 5 . 0}$ innings, which he'll get to use over three months or so. Handle him as a LOOGY: lefty-one-out-guy. His job is to get the big lefty shift out or out of the game in the middle innings, from the $5-7^{\text {th }}$ inning. Limit: 0.7 inning per game.
E.Rogers (C/D), RHP: With 78.7 innings, he's the guy we count on to eat up innings if we're down $4+$ runs or the starter gets knocked out early. He is Marquis' helpmate. He can be used for 1-2 batters around the $7^{\text {th }}$ to take advantage of big RH shifts (because of his peripherals), or he can go for longer than 2.7 innings to save other pitchers. No limits.
Chamberlain (D), RHP: Welcome back, Joba! If the game is out of reach, he has $\mathbf{6 0 . 3}$ innocuous innings to spread around during the course of the season. If he's in, it's JOBA TIME! Everybody drink! No limits.

USE THE CHART BELOW AS A QUICK REFERENCE GUIDE TO DETERMINE WHICH RELIEVER TO BRING IN WHEN. The section above has limits and usage notes. Besides E.Rogers, the roles are very well defined this year. If we need a reliever for innings $1-6$, it means the starter's been pounded out, so that means it's probably JOBA TIME! Except for E.Rogers, don't abuse the other relievers. Spread the work around. Thanks and good luck.
